

A Message to Parents


This guide about deployment is a child's activity book. It is our hope that the activities included in this guide will help you and your child cope with deployment.

My Family


Draw or paste a picture of your family below


Hold onto your box until your parent comes home. Have your parent send you some things to put in your treasure box. Share your box with your friends and family members.

You can go to the Zoo,








You can go for ice cream too!

Saying Goodbye



While your parent is away, have them send you stamps, money or other collectable items from the places they are visiting. You can put the special items in your treasure box until they get home.




Take Pictures
